MR. FULLER: At this point, do any members of the grand 1 jury have any factual questions for Detective Van Camp? Yes, 2 3 sir. JUROR: Did the doctor have him on some kind of 4 medications that would make him crazy like that? 5 THE WITNESS: I don't know of any medications Mr. Voden 6 7 takes for any mental type condition. 8 CLERK: Well, obviously he takes medicine for his 9 heart. THE WITNESS: He told me he had to go take some 10 aspirin, is what he actually had to go take. 11 MR. FULLER: Yes, ma'am. 12 JUROR: Had he been drinking or taking any form of a 13 14 drug? 15 THE WITNESS: No. Mr. Voden does not take any drugs or 16 alcohol, he told me. 17 MR. FULLER: Yes, sir. Was there actually, in fact, blood on the gun 18 JUROR: and his hands? 19 20 THE WITNESS: Yes. There was. Okay. So it probably would been 21 JUROR: 22 pretty close? THE WITNESS: Well, as of this time, I haven't 23 24 determined exactly how the gun got blood on it, or his hands being that the victim and him never had any physical contact. 25

Mr. Voden doesn't recall ever touching the victim or anything after the shooting of how he possibly could have gotten blood on his gun or him.

MR. FULLER: Yes, ma'am.

JUROR: On the 911 call he said his arm was twitching. Do you know which arm he was complaining about?

THE WITNESS: No, I don't know what that is. He discussed in my interview with him how his right hand doesn't close real well, only when it really needs to. When he was talking to me of how he was holding the gun and showing me how he had the gun straight out with one hand. So that's the only thing he talked about with his arm.

MR. FULLER: Yes, ma'am.

FOREPERSON: How far away was he for maybe blood splatter or?

THE WITNESS: Well, the exact distances is really unknown at this point. There's physical evidence that would suggest that the distance that Mr. Voden talked about, three to six feet at the beginning of the shooting would be pretty close, pretty accurate, because if you take into account of physics of a person walking towards another one. So there is a possibility that after the initial gunfire that the two of them did come together. Maybe the victim fell on the suspect.

Those are unknowns. There's no camera. There's no witness of that occurring, and Mr. Voden, himself, does not remember
